2. Annual Report Discussion

Commissioner Michalowski indicated that the Report is in the draft stage, which he will take the lead on. He asked commissioners to review the report and contribute information/additions/corrections that they may see. *[Query/discussion followed, including youth outreach initiatives]* Commissioner Michalowski stated that the goal would be to finalize agreement of the draft by the next meeting.

3. Public Recycle Update

Staff Liaison Akers explained that City Council allocated funding in this year's budget for public recycling containers. He provided an update as to the recycling grants which were applied for and awarded to the City to help assist with costs, and an update as to proposed roll-out details. *[Query/discussion followed]*

4. MGC Challenge Update

Commissioner Michalowski explained that those he was attempting to make contact with are on hiatus. He indicated that he learned that they were unable to get funding this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. He indicated that he would share any new information when it becomes available.

5. Penn Dam Update

Council Liaison Wilcoxon provided background history and discussed the grant which was awarded. He also shared information regarding the RFP that was done for engineering firms to work on the project and the scope of work which that encompasses. The public engagement aspect of the project was also discussed.

6. Resilience Hub Pilot Program Discussion

Commissioner Foley provided an update on the progress of his work with the resilience hub project. He and Staff Liaison Akers also discussed the concrete work to be done at Parkridge park. *[Discussion followed regarding the idea behind having a resilience hub, proposed items to be kept there and proposed distribution plans]*

7. Recycling Program Expansion Discussion

Commissioner Michalowski outlined some of the past problems regarding establishing a recycling drop-off point for City residents. Discussion followed as to possible remedies. Staff Liaison Akers discussed possible options under review and the challenges involved.

8. Renewable Energy Discussion

Commissioner Collins discussed the idea of capturing the blue algae that sits on Ford Lake to create bio energy for reuse, as well as utilizing methane gas hotspots as a form of renewable energy. Commissioner Bayha discussed her desire to follow up with Dave Strenski regarding his solar energy roof projects in the City.

9. Urban Gardening and Biodiversity Discussion

Commissioner Greenwald discussed the importance of urban gardening and local food systems to biodiversity conservations, indicating that the two topics pair well together. Commissioner Collins discussed the importance of and the challenges of maintaining a beneficial amount of pollinators in the community. Commissioner Michalowski initiated discussion as to ideas on how to possibly utilize vacant space in City-owned properties for these endeavors.

10. Neighborhood Groups/Associations Discussion

Commissioner Simmons discussed her thoughts for setting up this project. She asked for input from commissioners. *[Discussion followed as to possible ideas]*
