City Clerk

- Clerk
 - Staff is coordinating the implementation of the CivicClerk legislative management software. The contract with iCompass will expire at the end of September.
 - Snow Liang, a former Finance Department intern, has been hired as the Clerk/Treasury Generalist.
 - Staff has been working with other departments to update Chapter 7 based on Council discussion and from information derived through past renewal processes.
- Elections
 - The deadline to file for a Special Election for November is August 15th at 4pm.
 - City staff has been discussing partnering with the County Clerk's Office to assist with nine days of early voting. Staff is coordinating the use of the Friegthouse as one of the facilities on the eastern side of the county.
 - Several Bills have been introduced concerning, three of note are: implementation of early voting, potentially merging of the May and August election dates to a single date on the second Tuesday in June, and increase precinct size from 2,999 active voters, to 5,000.

Facilities

- Began repainting/repair of DPS exterior building trim, doors, and safety railings.
- Worked with Economic Development Department & WCBRA to analyze current condition of DPS Maintenance Garage and Salt Barn.

Forestry

- Continuing to assess and address issues with City trees since the Feb and March storms. Working with DDA on game plan to address downtown trees.

- Trees under/adjoining/within 10' of aerial utilities must be removed by a licensed contractor. Working with DTE on possible line clearance options and developing list of City trees needing trimmed or removed under lines.
- Performed storm-related branch and tree removal from parks and rights of way.

Streets

- Held an MDOT Bridge Safety Inspection Quality Assurance/Quality Control review meeting, conducted by Great Lakes Engineering on behalf of MDOT. This meeting is a review of our procedures for required bridge management, and occurs every 5-7 years. Overall, review went well and received useful feedback.
 - The City owns five road bridges; 4 over the Huron River and 1 railroad bridge. Two bridges are currently in poor condition (Forest, Cross), and one in Critical (Prospect).
 - The three pedestrian bridges owned by the City (Waterworks, Tridge, Heritage) are not inspected or reviewed under this program. No externally mandated inspection program exists for these bridges.
- Attended WATS Technical Committee.
- Patched throughout the City and along the Fourth of July Day Parade route, including: N Adams, Arnet, Ballard, Catherine, E Cross (x2), W Cross (x2), N Emerick, S Emerick, First, Ford, Freighthouse Parking Lot, Frog Island Parking Lot, Holmes, N Huron, S Huron parking lot (in preparation for Juneteenth), Normal, N River, Second (x2), Small, Tyler (x2), Wallace (x2), N Washington, S Washington (x2).
- Working with YPD on speed control/traffic discussions. Coordinating use of speed tracking devices rather than maintaining separate inventory/software/etc.
- Working with DTE to resolve right-of-way work issues.
 - Please remember that if you or your constituents smell natural gas outside, call 1-800-477-4747 *immediately* to report it.
- Continuing to work with MDOT and YCUA on their respective projects, as well as the separate MDOT contractor on the Michigan Avenue Bridge project.
- Huron River Drive (LeForge to Cornell) construction ongoing and on schedule. Eastbound traffic will be maintained and westbound traffic detoured. Hours of work are Monday through Saturday, 7am to 7pm.
- Please encourage your constituents to exercise their patience and drive safely, especially near construction zones. We have noticed many, many drivers moving barrels, barriers, and cones "out of their way" and driving into construction areas as soon as no workers appear to be present (and sometimes when they are). This practice can be very, very dangerous to the drivers and very costly to the City both in terms of delays and repair costs. We understand that construction season is frustrating- particularly this construction season- but we can all make it through together with patience and allowing some extra travel time.

Solid Waste

- 3743 96-gallon recycle carts were distributed to one- and two-family residences throughout Ypsilanti. Approximately 2,000 carts held by DPS for distribution to commercial and multifamily customers.
- Approximately 300 opt-in requests have been received for the recycle program from commercial and multifamily. To date, we have distributed more than 200 carts.
 - Transition to biweekly pickup schedule ongoing. We anticipate that this transition will result in savings to Fund 226 in labor and vehicle use; we anticipate seeing an increase in Drop-Off Station use as well as an uptick in Ypsi Township Compost Center use (the City pays the fee for dropoffs to the Compost Center). However, this frees up labor to address the backlog of issues with drains, mowing, streets, and trees. At the moment, the majority of this freed-up labor is currently helping

- to distribute requested carts. At the moment, we are not distributing additional carts to residential addresses; we anticipate this will change once we have the first round of commercial/multifamily dropoffs complete.
- The "Commercial Routes" will remain weekly as these are our higher-volume pickups. This includes downtown (note: downtown has cardboard recycling in two dumpster enclosures provided by the DDA), Depot Town, and West Cross.
 - NOTES:
 - We can no longer accept material placed beside the carts/outside of the carts. We will only accept what's inside the carts. This is for worker safety, to reduce litter, and most importantly to reduce contamination.
 - We will reject any contaminated load; we will not pick out/set aside any contaminants. This is to reduce contamination as well as to reduce the time spent on collection.
 - We are not and have not been picking up any red bins since May 26th. We will be instructing Stevens to pick them up, bin and all, for trash disposal beginning the week of July 17th; the only exception will be for bins being used for yard waste.
 - Continued work with WRRMA on joint trash pickup RFP; identifying unique City needs.
 - Updated City website extensively on recycling and yard waste options; now includes more information about material that can and cannot be accepted curbside for recycling as well as additional information about invasive species we are unable to accept in curbside yard waste, including Japanese Knotweed. Stormwater

- Working with Planning & Development Department to improve communication with developers and process around stormwater compliance issues.
- Swept along the Fourth of July Parade route (both before and immediately following) and throughout the City, including: N Congress, S Congress, Grant, Pearl, Seridan, Sherman, N Washington, Westmoorland, E Cross, E Forest, W Cross, W Forest, Ferris, S Washington.
- Worked with Pipeline Management on investigation of storm infrastructure failures. Identified solution for one of three failures. Exploring additional failure locations. Two of the investigated locations appear to require open excavation to investigate and repair.
- Continued inventory/inspection of all catchbasins.

- 6/2 Engine 1 OOS- E-1 has a blown motor and it will be quicker and cheaper to rebuild the current motor and buy an extended warranty. The cost to rebuild will be approximately \$25K and is expected to be out of service for 2 months. A reconditioned motor will take at least 2 months to get and cost roughly \$15K more, and the truck may be out of service twice as long. I am having the motor rebuilt.

Overall Department Status Update:

- Actively working on approved Fire Station Capital Improvements.
- YFD hosted a 3-day training program that was extended to our AMA partners. The Through The Lock training taught firefighters alternatives to forcible entry.
